IT'S the first time Paradise Beach Purveyors has dipped into the realm of awards ceremonies but the company has walked away from Royal Sydney with a host of gongs.

The four-year-old Manly Vale foods manufacturer has picked up two gold, two silver, and two champion awards at the Sydney Royal Fine Foods Show, presented earlier this

Owners Steve Ingram and Anmarie Dabinet, both of Avalon, were surprised at the medal haul.

"It's the biggest competition in the country," he said.

"We thought it would be nice to get something. You don't expect to sweep the board."

The company won gold for its pesto swirl and tzatziki: silver for its smoked trout and red pepper pesto: the Champion Dip or Dairy Dessert; and Most Successful Dip and Dairy Dessert Exhibitor.

Sydney Royal called Paradise Beach Purveyors and asked the company to enter.

"When the announcements were made I think we had a glass of champagne and said, Whoopee'," Mr Ingram said.

"The blood rushed to my head and I almost fainted.

"We've never entered awards before. We've always been focused on making food that we enjoy and that we like to serve to our friends.'

Paradise Beach Purveyors is named after the tiny beach next to Clareville Beach, where the company started.

The other northern beaches establishment to be recognised at Sydney Royal was Michael's Fine Foods, from Cromer Heights, which won 11 silver medals.

Michael's specialty was also the dips and dairy section and it recorded accolades for its dips, butters and mousse.
